CFUW St. John's Sponsored Children, Laini Saba Primary School, Kibera, Nairobi, Kenya



It was my delight and privilege to visit in May with the three CFUW Sponsored children, (L to R) Yvonne Omusula, Gillian Museve and Carolyne Mueni.


Yvonne and Carolyne we have supported for several years. There was widespread fear during April and May that the Kenyan elections would be violent and dangerous. (I didn't book airfare until mid-May when I felt it was safe to visit Kibera). The family of our former child, Sally Meya moved back to live with relatives because of their fear. The petite, smiling Gillian has replaced Sally. Gillian is an AIDs orphan living with her aunt. She walks an hour each way to the school.

These children live in the Kibera slum, with at least a million people. It is a slum with huts wall to wall and narrow pitted, debris-cluttered lanes. Most of the people have to buy water, a basic need of life, getting it at various points in their jerry cans. Most families live in single rooms. They have to go to public latrines and pay to use them.

The railway track is the main road in Kibera slum, with all kinds of foodstuffs, clothing and utensils on sale on either side. The track is full of women, children and men with yellow plastic jerry cans collecting water and buying necessities. When a train comes all the goods are gotten to a safer place and people leap off to the side in a split second.

I became involved with the projects of the Sacred Heart Sisters in Uganda and Kenya because my mother and Sr. Margie Conroy's mother were lifelong, childhood friends. Margie, a young 84, who has lived 43 years in Uganda accompanied me to Kibera, and Sr. Anastasia Shibuste, principal, spent many hours with us and provided me with the information for this article.



I was deeply moved by many experiences at Laini Saba Primary School: children happily playing games during recess, meeting two young men I had sponsored from Grade 5 - now finished postsecondary education and working; one as a teacher and the other as an IT specialist outside of Kibera, meeting with Sr. Anastasia Shibutse, principal, whose knowledge of each of the 465 children under her care was astonishing, thanking the school counsellor for painstakingly investigating and following each child in Sr. Margie Conroy's Sponsorship Program and just being in a caring school environment.

Life is a Lottery. I was born in St. John's. I could have been born in the Kibera Slum. My latest visit to Kibera reinforced my belief that - while I had no power over where I was born – I have power over how I can help others.

Feel proud you are giving Yvonne, Gillian and Carolyne an education – the means to a better life.
