EXECUTIVE REPORTS

President's Report

Hazel Pritchett Harris

Our Club has had another successful year! Of course, we are all aware of how busy we seem to be throughout the year but reflecting on the year as a whole brings into focus just how active and productive we have been. When you read through the reports from the Committees and from various Study and Interest groups, you will see the breadth and depth of our activities.

There is no need for me to recapitulate all that is written in the individual reports contained in this Annual Report but I should like to make a few comments about the year which is just ending. As many of you know, I am a mathematician and my graduate work was done in a field allied to Category Theory, so you will not be surprised if I categorize my comments! You will notice that I use the word "record" quite a few times!

Membership: When Barbara wrote her president's report last year, she was proud to point out the increase in membership, which then stood at 104. This year we reached 112! Thank you to all those who introduced friends and colleagues to the pleasure of being a member of our Club. I hope that all new members have enjoyed their first year with us as much as we have enjoyed having them. It is gratifying to see how actively involved our newer members are and they have made valuable contributions through their participation in Study and Interest Groups. Some of those who joined a year or two ago have already taken on increased responsibility for Committees. All of us are aware of what can be accomplished through the "power of women helping women". We can feel that we are making a real contribution (on local, national, and international levels) as we raise money to fund scholarships for women and through our advocacy and outreach activities.

Scholarships/educational Ventures: We gave away a record number of scholarships and bursaries last year and the budget for 2015-16 (which we passed in April) will continue to fund the same number of awards as in 2014-15. In addition we were able to increase the amount which we give to the national Charitable Trust. A very exciting addition this year is the creation of an "Anniversary Scholarship Fund" which will fund one-off scholarships to mark some significant anniversaries: our Club's 70th this year and our 75th in 2020, and the 100th anniversary of the founding of (the national) CFUW in 2019. The amount in this fund now stands at \$5000 and we hope to be able to add to this in the coming years. I have found that the greatest pleasure of being President comes when I attend award ceremonies to present our

scholarships and bursaries and to meet the recipients. They are always so enthusiastic about their work and so grateful to us for the award.

Advocacy and Local Outreach: Our Issues and Resolutions Committee had a record number of members this year. We continued our emphasis on the elimination/prevention of violence against women, starting with our guest speaker at the Open House, Michelle Smith, Director of Violence Prevention at the Women's Policy Office. Do take the time to read about all the issues which that Committee addressed; they cover a wide range of activities. Through our New Beginnings Baskets, we also continued to support those women leaving Iris Kirby House to set up independent living.

Program: The Program Committee is to be commended for their interesting choice of speakers. I am sure that this is one of the reasons why we had such good attendance at our meetings.

Communication: As Barbara predicted in her report last year, our website has been used as the method of communication with our members. There we are able to find timely and up to date information about events and activities. With the encouragement of the Executive, I started the monthly Notices and News in October to replace the quarterly Newsletter. There have been many favourable comments so we shall continue with that.

Fundraising: Yet another record this year: our Book Sale raised over \$55 000! We had a very large Committee and it was good to see how many members, both new and old, were involved. The budget will show how we plan to disburse these funds over the coming year. It never ceases to amaze us that the proceeds from the Book Sale increase every year. In addition to the money we raise, it is gratifying to note that books are still popular; we shall not soon forget that long queue around the Arts and Culture Centre on the opening Wednesday night.

Club Members: We were all saddened by the passing of Elizabeth Piper, a valued Club member. She had served on the Executive as Secretary and as a member of the Program Committee. We shall remember her cheerful presence, her outstanding organizational abilities, and her wonderful cooking and baking. Some of Elizabeth's talents lay hidden from many but her closest friends and family. The display of her beautiful paintings and exquisite quilts and wall hangings at the funeral home attested to how creative she truly was. We will miss her but are the richer for having known her. Through this past year, many of our members have had to cope with their own personal losses and illnesses. We have shared their sorrow and their pain.

Events and Meetings: It has been my great pleasure to have represented the Club at many meetings and events this year. As incoming president, I attended the 2014 CFUW AGM at Kitchener-Waterloo with Barbara. We were impressed by the high regard in which our Club is held. In October I attended the Atlantic Regional Conference in Saint John, NB. Grace Hollett, as VP Atlantic, chaired the events and

Barbara Clancy, RD for Newfoundland and Labrador, also attended, taking an active part in proceedings. Also in the fall, Joyce Noseworthy and I were the guests of the MUN President at an interesting lecture and lovely reception for Scholarship donors. I was in England at the time of the MUN Chancellor's Circle Dinner for patrons but our Cub was ably represented by Grace Hollett and Bertha Schofield. There were four award ceremonies during the year: I presented two scholarships at the Marine Institute in November and Sharon Kieley accompanied me; I presented scholarships to two other students at the Marine Institute in March; I attended the awards ceremony at the College of the North Atlantic in late April. Also in late April, I presented the Women in Policing scholarships to the four newly commissioned special constables and was pleased that Gillian Brown came with me.

PROJECT REPORTS

Report of the Book Sale Committee

This year our annual book sale was held on April 15-17 and it was an unprecedented success! We sold nearly \$55,000.00 worth of books and, even accounting for our expenses, made a profit of more than \$48,000.00!

Planning for the sale began with the first meeting of the 24-member Book Sale Committee on January 31. At that time, we made revisions to our book sorting and pricing guidelines and agreed to introduce the concept of student vouchers – giving students who spent \$10.00 or more during the sale a pass to collect as many free books as they wanted once the sale was over. This initiative proved very successful as quite a number of books were taken away at the end of the sale.

We also decided to schedule only one collection blitz this year. It was held on Feburary 28 and was wildly successful, both our 17-ft collector trucks being filled to capacity after just 2 hours of collection. We continued to accept books dropped off at the sorting site for the next two weeks.

Once again, we were fortunate to have the use of the former Pennington's

Superstore on Hamlyn Road, thanks to the generosity of CrombieReit. This large space allowed us to sort, price and store our books in comfort. We had the room to alphabetize our fiction sections and to expand the number of our non-fiction categories. One of the new categories we introduced this year was World War I and II; this category proved to be so successful that all the books even remotely related to this were sold almost as soon as they were placed on the table!

The Royal Newfoundland Constabulary cadets were available to help again this year. They were involved in moving the books to the Arts and Culture Centre on Monday, April 13 and in setting up the tables and bringing the books to the appropriate tables on Tuesday, April 14. Their availability meant that we did not need to hire additional workers.

Other groups and individuals outside our Club helped to make the sale a success. The MUN School of Music generously allowed us to use their MMaP room for both storing our books and allowing us to sell books in it. Members of WAMUN volunteered, as always, to help with both the sorting and pricing and the book sale set up. Several of our members brought friends to help at all stages of the process. And the male relatives of many of our members were invaluable at all stages, from the initial table set-up at Hamlyn Road to the move of our gear at the end of the sale to our storage locker at U-Store-It, kindly donated free of charge by Eldon Bessey. Thank you to everyone who participated in the book sale effort!

Report of the NAPS (Newfoundland Art Posters in Schools)

Sixteen CFUW volunteers have continued this year to distribute Newfoundland art posters to schools throughout the Avalon Peninsula and Eastern Newfoundland. In January all principals in the Eastern School District were contacted via email informing them about our program and, as a result, six new schools were added, including Holy Name of Mary Academy in Lawn on the Burin Peninsula. Several new posters were also added to the collection this year.

We would like to thank our wonderful volunteers who make this program possible. To each and every one of them who faithfully drive to the schools to distribute and collect posters, and who help clean and maintain the collection in the spring – again we say many, many thanks.

Next year two new members will take over the co-ordination of the NAPS program. Bea Courtney and Jennifer Jeans will help close out this year at our collection day in June, and will be at the helm in September. We have enjoyed working with such dedicated women during the past eight years and we wish all the best for the NAPS program in the future.

STUDY GROUP REPORT

Report of the Issues and Resolutions Study Group

Resolutions passed at the national AGM of CFUW are used in four ways: as a tool for public awareness; to positively express our concerns; to create partnerships and coalitions with like-minded organizations; and to react to issues and governments' agendas.

CFUW St. John's wrote letters to MP's Ryan Cleary, Scott Andrews and Jack Harris, on the following issues:

- Enhancing Canada's Pension Plan for those people whose earnings are reduced because they must withdraw from the workforce for child rearing or to care for family members who are seriously ill.
- Restoring and maintaining Canada's documentary heritage by restoring and preserving the collections of the Public Library, research documents, and collections of scientific institutes and departmental libraries.
- Redrafting election reforms for federal elections so that fairness and impartiality in voting is guaranteed.

At AGM 2014, CFUW decided to continue its emphasis on the elimination and prevention of Violence Against Women for another year. CFUW St. John's took the following actions in support of this initiative:

- i. Letters were sent to the provincial government from Hazel (club president) and Grace (V.P. Atlantic Canada) asking for the reinstatement of the NL Family Violence Intervention Court. This court essentially provided intervention in situations of family violence and served as a means of helping people who were willing to admit their behavior was wrong and who showed a willingness to change it. (Note: In the last budget this court was reinstated by the government.)
- ii. Members of the Issues and Resolutions Committee (I &R) attended meetings of the Coalition Against Violence Avalon East (CAVAE) and participated in the White Van/Purple Ribbon campaign. Once again we provided notebooks with an anti-violence message. Members also attended the CAVAE Vigil for murdered women that took place in Bowring Park on Oct. 23rd.
- iii. November 25 was the International Day for the Elimination of Violence and the beginning of 16 days of action to eliminate Violence Against Women (VAW). In an effort to bring attention to VAW, two members of the Issues and Resolutions committee drafted a letter for publication in

the telegram. The letter was sent under the signature of our president but once again, the letter was not published. The White Van project took place during this period as well as the vigil for those young women who were killed at Ecole Polytechnique in Montreal. The I & R committee was pleased to see twelve club members attend the December vigil – the largest attendance to date!!

iv. The I &R Committee is researching the possibility of providing a scholarship to a woman who has suffered domestic violence and is looking to improve her skills through education.

In the fall members of the I & R Committee watched two films available from the NFB: Buying Sex (a film about prostitution and ways to ameliorate it), and Sexy (a film about the hyper-sexualization of young girls). Buying Sex inspired Natalie Duchesne, CFUW member and teacher in Women's Studies at MUN, to develop a three-day workshop entitled **Sex Work: Soliciting Reflection**. The workshop encouraged discussion about sex workers in the community and challenged preconceived notions about sex workers. Students and the general public were invited to attend.

Two Resolutions were researched and presented to CFUW St. John's at the February general meeting. Resolution One pertained to saving pollinators and placing a moratorium on the use of neonicotinoid pesticides. Resolution Two spoke to reducing climate change through the use of carbon taxes. The club approved both resolutions with some suggestions for changes to wording.

Finally, the I & R committee brought to the club's attention the **UP for Debate Campaign** which calls for all political parties to commit to a federal leaders debate on issues identified by women. The last such debate took place 30 years ago. Members can encourage the political parties to hold the debate in the following ways:
