#### MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE REPORT - Sharon Walsh, Chair

This past year CFUW ST. John's has experienced an increase in membership. The total 2018-2019 membership is 128.

#### **Membership Recruitment:**

•September membership open house and social: Membership recruitment began with the annual membership open house and social held on Saturday, September 22 at St Augustine's Church Hall. The meeting marked the beginning of the 2018–2019 CFUW year. The event was widely advertised through public service announcements, extending an invitation to all interested women. At this time, members were given the opportunity to renew membership and new members were registered.

Membership kits were given to the new members who joined at that time, and all members were given a program for 2018-2019. Program information was given to guests who expressed an interest in finding out more about the CFUW St. Iohn's club.

- **Membership Drive:** A designated membership drive was held during March and April. Each member was asked to invite one person to our monthly meeting. Many members brought along a friend or relative to the meeting.
- **Online Membership:** The online membership once again resulted in several completed membership applications with 3 members joining. Personal contact was made with applicants who completed the membership application card. The potential members were provided with general information.
- **Book sale:** Our annual book sale provided an opportunity to promote membership in the club. The book committee, through their many interviews with the media in promoting the book collection and the book sale, provided a venue to highlight the history and mission of CFUW St. John's Club. Membership invitations were also available for distribution at this event.
- **Membership monthly meetings**: Throughout the year members were encouraged to bring along a friend at the meetings. This resulted in an increase in attendance at the monthly meetings. Thank you to everyone who participated in the membership recruitment throughout the year.

#### **OUTREACH COMMITTEE REPORT - Margie Greene, Chair**

The Outreach Committee this year had a budget of \$10,000 sourced from our annual "Great Big Book Sale". This year's committee members included Gillian Brown, Maureen Leat, Bertha Schofield, Beverly Lee, Joan McCue, Libby Foran, Gwen Mercer and Margie Greene (Chair). We continued to support Iris Kirby House with baskets of household goods for those leaving Kirby House to set up their own households. We filled these with goods donated monthly by our members and we set aside \$1000 to top up the baskets with needed items.

We also set aside \$1000 for an initiative involving the RNC Violence Prevention to buy locks for women who need to change locks on their doors because of abusive partners and who can not afford to purchase them.

We provided financial support to a blind student from a rural community so that he could attend an orientation session of post-secondary institutions, sponsored by the CNIB. We supported the Just Us Women's Program at Stella's Circle and a nutrition education and breakfast program at the Association of New Canadians and we paid for participants to take a First Aid program at Thrive. We also supported Teachers On Wheels with the purchase of materials, the Home Again Furniture Bank and The Boys and Girls Club.

Our members who attended the meetings took turns bringing wonderful baked goods, cheeses and fruit, so that the monthly meetings often fed the mind and the stomach. The Program Committee is looking forward to another successful year together.

# PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE REPORT - Libby Foran, Chair

This year we have continued to engage the community by publicizing our activities and events. Information on our Open House in September and monthly

meetings has been shared with the local media and churches, and posted on major websites such as the MUN Events page, the Community Sector Council, and Rogers Community website. The Go Guide in the Telegram has also been a great source in getting our message out to the general public, for all events. Our email contact list for members is updated regularly so that members can be informed of club activities and items of interest.

Joyce Noseworthy has maintained the CFUW St. John's website. Our website address is http://cfuwstjohns.org. Our President, Dianne Reddy provided members with a monthly Notices and News bulletin which has been very informative and timely. Our Regional Director for Newfoundland, Grace Stapleton, and National President, Grace Hollett, have represented our club at the national level and provided information on our activities.

The most widely publicized activity for our group is the annual Great Big Book Sale. It was held May 6, 7, & 8th, 2019. Bea Courtney, Jennifer Jeans, and I managed publicity for the Book Sale Committee. Activities for this event included the printing and distribution of posters, flyers and handouts, and organizing and maintaining a Facebook page for the event, a more current method of connecting with the community for many people. Our media contacts, church contacts and previously mentioned websites were most helpful in getting the word out. Public service announcements on various media were well received. Initially, the public were provided with information regarding the collection site, and this was subsequently followed by details about the sale. Thank you to our members who used personal contacts and social media to spread information about the activities of our club. We have been greatly supported by the community for this project and are very appreciative.

Our Scholarship Committee and executive members attend award ceremonies at MUN, CNA and the Marine Institute to present our scholarships or bursaries. Our Outreach Committee sometimes meet representatives of community groups, who benefit from financial support through our programs. Both of these types of events often have photo opportunities, with pictures posted on the websites of the organization we have supported.

Once again CFUW St. John's had a very successful Book Sale, and was able to fund scholarships and bursaries for women at Memorial University, Marine Institute, and College of the North Atlantic for the 2018-2019 academic year. The list was approved at the 2018 AGM, and most of the funds disbursed in June/July 2018. The recipients of the awards were chosen by the appropriate faculty members at the institutions.

#### **Memorial University of Newfoundland**

On October 30, the School of Graduate Studies hosted a reception to celebrate the establishment of our \$7500 CFUW St. John's Grace Hiscock Hollett 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary Scholarship. This is a one time graduate scholarship named in honour of Grace Hollett, the first national president from CFUW St. John's. It celebrates the 100<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of CFUW in 2019, and the 75<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of CFUW St. John's in 2020. It will be awarded to a full-time female graduate student in any Master's or Doctoral program at MUN. Our thanks go to the School of Graduate Studies for sponsoring this event, which was attended by Grace Hollett's family, and members of CFUW St. John's. At the time of this report the recipient had not been announced.

In June, 2018, the documents I had organized during the winter were delivered to the Archives and Special Collections section at the QEII Library, MUN. Our club provided funding of \$2000.00 to hire a work term student for the purpose of combining this material with two other collections of club documents. One set was already housed at the Archives, and the other one had been discovered during the winter at the Provincial Archives. A Deed of Gift dated June 12, 2018 recorded the presentation.

In November we received a copy of the Finding Aid, a comprehensive list of textual material relating to the non-current activities of the St. John's Club since 1945. It includes annual reports, correspondence, minutes of meetings, financial documents, conference material, reports and briefs. This collection also includes photographs, newspaper articles, and CFUW St. John's newsletters.

It was recommended that an Archives Policy be developed that would provide guidance for the selection and preparation of future material to be deposited in the collection. The new Policy was approved by members at the May 2019 general meeting.

# **PROJECT REPORTS**

# **BOOK SALE REPORT - Joyce Noseworthy, Chair**

I am pleased to report that, once again, our book sale was a great success – we sold nearly \$64,000 worth of books, clearing a profit of just over \$58,000.

This year we decided to limit our book collection period to just four weeks in a deliberate attempt to have significantly fewer books than last year. As a result, we opened the sale with about 50,000 books, around 20,000 fewer than the previous year. This resulted in a successful sale, with very few books left for us to dispose of at the end. We started our collection on March 1 and continued until March 30, which gave us the month of April to complete the book sorting and planning for the sale itself.

This year, we moved the start time to 5:00 pm on the opening night. Buyers began to line up around 3:00 pm and it took about an hour after the doors opened for everyone in the line to enter the building. We received many favourable comments from both customers and volunteers, many stating that this year's sale was the best organized yet.

As always, many groups and individuals outside our Club were indispensible in making the sale a success. We thank Campbell's Rent-Alls for providing the tables at a reduced rate; Eldon Bessey for the storage locker for our supplies; Cyril Hayden for organizing the disposal of our recycling and garbage; Don Clarke, Garland Jennings, John Musgrave and Paul Murphy who helped keep things moving throughout the entire sorting, pricing and boxing process; and, of course, CrombieReit for the use of the Woodgate Plaza space, and the management and staff of the St. John's Curling Club. We are also grateful to the many relatives and friends of members who helped at all phases of the operation – from bringing our gear to Woodgate Plaza in March to moving material out of the ReMax Centre at the end of the sale and at every phase in between.

#### **STUDY GROUPS**

#### ISSUES AND RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE - Gillian Brown, Chair

The Issues and Resolutions Committee of CFUW St. John's strives to support the work of the national organization by taking action on resolutions and other initiatives adopted by the national body at the AGM of CFUW. As a member of the Violence Prevention (Avalon East) the Committee also seeks to support the activities of member groups.

With no Resolutions to be debated at the Annual General Meeting in 2019, the Issues and Resolutions Committee has been relatively inactive this year. Two meetings were held to discuss actions that might be taken on the Resolutions passed in July 2018. As a result letters were written to our three MPs, the honorable Nick Whelan, Minister Shamus O' Reagan and the honourable Ken McDonald. Letters written concerned the following:

- Resolution 1: Fair and non- discriminatory management of refugees and asylum seekers
- Resolution 2: Ending Youth Homelessness
- Resolution 3: Education to serve as a vehicle for social justice for vulnerable children living in closed religious communities.

We received one response from Nick Whelan.

A suggestion was made to the Programs Committee to have someone from Choices for Youth speak to our group on Youth Homelessness in St. John's.

1. **International Women's Day:** CFUW St. John's held its second annual IWD luncheon at the Sheraton Hotel. Barbara Clancy read the poem "Bread and Roses"

and the 14 attendees reflected on the many changes women experienced during their lifetimes. It was an enjoyable event.

- 2. Violence Prevention and Awareness (VP AE): CFUW continues to be a member of Violence Prevention (Avalon East). The focus of their quarterly meetings seems to have changed in that many of the presentations are geared to building the skills of front line workers. We therefore have not attended quite as many meetings. We support the activities of their member organizations when ever possible. All CFUW members were invited to attend the Sisters in Spirit Vigil and the Day of Remembrance Vigil at MUN. This year 5 or 6 of our members (the largest response yet!) attended the Sisters in Spirit Vigil, held in October. At the Day of Remembrance Vigil held in December, President Dianne and RD Grace, dedicated the Ecole Polytechnique scholarship in remembrance of one of the victims. CFUW ST. John's donates to this scholarship through a collection at the Christmas dinner. We participated in 16 Days of Activism to Prevent Violence Against Women and Girls by forwarding a message from VP (Avalon East.).
- 3. In November, Members of CFUW St. John's were encouraged to participate in a Ban Hand Guns consultation hosted by the federal government.
