COMMITTEE REPORTS

MEMBERSHIP COMMITTEE REPORT – Susan McNicholas, Chair

Membership:

Our membership for 2021-2022 numbers 91, which includes 1 student member. This number is down by 8 from last year. Although a few members left CFUW, we were very happy to welcome new members Valerie Fish, Helen Fleming and Diane Hollett.

Membership Retention:

As we generally feature our September membership open house and social to attract new members, Covid restrictions prevented this valuable opportunity again this year.

We are anticipating additional interest in CFUW with our Annual Book Sale which is returning this year on June 21 – 24.

We encourage members to keep in touch by viewing our Facebook page: CFUW St. John's and our private group: Members Only of CFUW St. John's. We contact our members monthly by email with news of activities that they may take part in. A number of our interest groups have begun meeting again as we try to make life a bit more normal. A July outing is planned at Gull Pond which is close to Sunshine Park. It is hoped that many will attend this barbecue on July 7. Executive meetings continued by Zoom this year. It worked quite well, and all executive members are happy to meet in the same way for the foreseeable future.

Our monthly meetings continued by Zoom for the year as there was not good support for in-person-meetings in a large lecture room at Memorial University. Invited speakers engaged our attendees with a topic of interest. In addition to our own members, many members of CFUW clubs across Canada partook in our meetings by Zoom and enjoyed hearing presentations by our guest speakers.

OUTREACH COMMITTEE REPORT – Margie Greene, Chair

The Social Outreach Committee was not active during 2021-2022; however, the donation of baskets to Iris Kirby House continued.

We began as a partner with the IODE (Imperial Order of the Daughters of the Empire) in the program known as "Fresh Start" to supply household items to women leaving Kirby House Women's Shelter. In 2014 the project changed its name to New Beginnings and became a project run completely by CFUW, St. John's. Thanks to the generosity of our members, we have given 309 baskets to women leaving Kirby House Women's shelter over the past number of years at the rate of 2 to 3 baskets a month. We have also provided 15 baskets to the first tenants of Cochrane Street housing units and three to Seniors NL.

These baskets are completely funded through the generosity of our members who bring needed items to our monthly meetings. During the pandemic we have had generous donations of cash which has enabled us to buy needed items. This is a project of our club, independent of national office. This year we had some generous donations of toiletries and sanitary products from the We Care Foundation. These laundry baskets contain kitchen and bathroom items needed to get through the first few days in a new place. Included is everything from towels, soap and toilet paper to mugs, teabags, sugar and milk. Items are collected at our monthly meetings and for years were stored at the home of committee member, Pat Collins. Pat has moved out of the province and items are now stored with Margie Greene.

The basket committee usually meets every second month to fill the baskets and deliver them. The past few years we have allocated money in our outreach budget to help with expenses but for years this project was almost completely supplied by donations of items at our monthly meetings. We also accepted cash donations to buy items such as the baskets and brooms and dustpans. We usually indicate in the News and Notices which items we are particularly low on but are happy to accept all items.

During the pandemic our regular schedule was interrupted. Issues included isolation rules that prevented us from meeting or going to Iris Kirby House, no donation of items because our club meetings were virtual, fewer shopping trips etc. We are grateful for the cash donations from members and for the donation of supplies

from the We Care Foundation. We continued to supply baskets on as regular a schedule as we could.

Again, thank you from Basket Committee Members Ann Hinton, Libby Foran, Dianne Murray, Joan McCue and me. New committee members are Sheila Genge and Bertha Schofield.

PROGRAM COMMITTEE REPORT – Amrita Ghosh, Chair

Eva De Mariaffi stepped down as Chair of the Committee in April, 2021 and Jenn Deon and I started working as co-chairs of the Committee in May. We were joined on the Committee by Linda Patzold, Sandra Clark, Wanda Saunders, and Zainab Jarrett. Jenn resigned as Co-Chair in September 2021.

Because of COVID-19 restrictions, we were unable to have any face-to-face meetings. Our Club did not meet in the fall of 2021, but had our monthly meetings via Zoom. Below is a list of our Guest Speakers and their topics:

September 14, 2021: Wazhma Frogh, Peace & Conflict Practitioner & Mediator, planned to talk to us on "The 20 Years Journey of Afghan Women and back". However, her talk was rescheduled, and our then co-chair program committee Jenn Deon led the conversation and talked about Wazhma's background, work, and moving speech on the United Nations stage.

October 12, 2021: Our member Dr. Margot I. Duley, spoke locally and nationally via zoom on "Armine Gosling, Suffragist and Reformer: Historical Reflections a Century Later" and hosted a discussion session afterwards. Dr. Duley is Professor Emerita of History at Eastern Michigan University and Dean Emerita, College of Liberal Arts and Sciences, the University of Illinois, Springfield.

November 9, 2021: Wazhma Frogh's talk was rescheduled, and she presented on "The 20 Years Journey of Afghan Women and back". The night ended with Wazhma answering members' (from various CFUW clubs) questions.

December 14, 2021: We had a Christmas storytelling session within our club via zoom. Three of our members, Gillian Brown, Hilda Murray, and Zainab Jarrett, shared Christmas stories in an informal and relaxed style. One of our special interest groups, "Women on Tap," provided us with a tap-dancing video which was played over the zoom and our members enjoyed the video and appreciated the beautiful performance by the group.

January 11, 2022: Our member Dr. Carol Haddad, a Professor Emerita of Technology Studies and Women's Studies at Eastern Michigan University, talked locally and nationally via Zoom on "Ungendering Technology; Women Retooling the Masculine Sphere". The night ended with a detailed discussion and question-answer session led by Dr. Haddad.

February 8, 2022: Elizabeth Siegel, Director of Information and Referral Services at SeniorsNL, talked to our club about the crisis across long term care (LTC)

in Newfoundland and Labrador and answered various questions our members had on LTC.

March 8, 2022: Our club celebrated the International Women's Day with our members and members from other CFUW clubs with a presentation on the topic "Challenges and Successes of Women in Peacekeeping" by Shelagh Steven, former UN Peacekeeper and member of CFUW Perth and District and CFUW International Relation Committee.

April 12, 2022: Our guest speaker from April was Michelle Corbett, MSW, RSW, and Coordinator of Social Supports at First Light, who presented in person at the Lecture theatre of Carew Building, MUN and also via Zoom (hybrid meeting). Michelle spoke to us on "How First Light is Supporting Indigenous Women and Girls," and the presentation concluded with a question-answer session.

May 10, 2022: Kaberi Sarma-Debnath, Executive Director (ED) of the Multicultural Women's Organization of NL (MWONL), spoke on the topic "Women and Gender Equality from Immigrant Women's Perspective" in an informal style and afterwards answered members' questions.

PUBLIC RELATIONS COMMITTEE REPORT – Amrita Ghosh and Grace Hollett, Co-Chairs Chair

Social Media: Amrita Ghosh

September 2021: I started maintaining / posting information about meetings on the public Facebook page and members' only group on Facebook.

October 2021: I opened a Twitter account and issued an invitation via public Facebook page for the October general meeting.

November 2021: I started taking notes of the Facebook profile visits and activities statistics. Facebook activity increased, and we noticed that 1.9k people have visited our profile and interacted with the posts. There was not much activity on our Twitter page.

December 2021: There was no update regarding our social media activities.

January 2022: Facebook: People reached: 45% reduced, Post engagements: 53% reduced, Page likes: 63% reduced.

Twitter: The number of followers increased by 5.

February 2022: Facebook: People reached: decreased by 14%, Post engagements reduced by 38%, Page likes: increased by 52%. Twitter: The number of followers increased by 3.

March 2022: Facebook: People reached: 860 (increased 473%), Post engagements: 130 (increased 210%), Page likes: 11 (increased 267%).

Twitter: The number of followers increased by 4.

April 2022: Facebook: People reached: 936 (increased 489%), Post engagements: 162 (increased 440%), Page likes: 18 (increased 333%).

Twitter: The number of followers increased by3.

May 2022: Facebook: People reached: 219 (decreased 76%), Post engagement: 40 (decreased 72%), Page likes 2 (increased 67%). Twitter: The number of followers increased was 2.

Other PR Activities: Grace Hollett

Focus

PR has been focused primarily on three audiences, members of CFUW St. John's, the local public and other CFUW Clubs, along with some international coverage. Messages to each audience may be individualized or may be the same

All Executive meetings, all General Meetings and Interest Groups who at various times use Zoom, have been scheduled, promoted and hosted through my Zoom account with members being notified via email and relevant resources distributed. Notes are forwarded, as appropriate, to Amrita to post on Facebook and to Joyce for the website. All Club Action Newsletters have been forwarded to members with selected items of possible local interest being highlighted.

Other forwarded notices include local meetings with speakers of possible interest to our members e.g., the Newfoundland Historical Society and the Wessex Society. Internationally, notice has been forwarded of webinars from the Wilson Centre and Federations of Women's Groups. Prior to and during two weeks in March 2022, members were given information allowing access to join the parallel sessions of the Commission on the Status of Women (CSW). Recordings of many of those may be found on the UN website.

Club Members

A Getting to Know You series on our Club members has started with others preparing information about themselves and their interests for later publication on the Club Facebook page. The membership List was circulated to all members, edited to account for any reported changes or errors and re-circulated.

General Meetings

All ten meetings have been hosted through my Zoom account with the April meeting, a hybrid, being partly in-person. The tradition of inviting the public to our meetings with a speaker has expanded from announcements in the local media to include promotion with a poster in CFUW's national Club Action News which has also international access. We have had national attendance all those meetings, notably. Kathryn Wilkinson, National President, and many very positive comments about our programs.

Other PR for CFUW St. John's

As a member of the CFUW planning group, I suggested Newfoundland's Elizabeth Siegel as a panelist for "Invisible No More: A Continuum of Care for Elder Rights & Long-Term Care Justice in Canada" theme. This was a public event, held May 4, 2022 and co-presented by CFUW, <u>HelpAge Canada</u>, the <u>Canadian Health Coalition</u>,

and the <u>Ontario Health Coalition</u>. I promoted the event to our members via email, while Amrita promoted through the Club's Face Book pages.

Amrita and I, as one of the CFUW delegates, collaborated on promotion for the UN CSW (Commission on the Status of Women) session on Climate Migration offered in March and being presented again on September 9, 2022 with the same speakers from Mexico, USA and Canada with me as moderator and Amrita producing the poster being seen world-wide via Federations and Associations of Graduate Women International (GWI), in addition to CFUW.

In February I was invited to speak about our Book Sale and its linkage to scholarships and membership recruitment, at the collaborative Communications Committee and Membership Committee national webinar **"Marketing and Recruitment Strategies"**. This was followed by participating in one of the Spring Dialogues about membership and promotion.

On May 22nd I will be presenting on at a CFUW International Relations webinar on Replicating and Amplifying Clubs' Programs/International Action. As requested, I will be concentrating on our speakers of the 2021-22 who have had an international message e.g., Wazhma Froog of Afghanistan and Canada.

Current PR Concentration

Promotion is now in full swing following the decision last week to go ahead, June 21-24, with the Great Big Book Sale (postponed from 2020). Digital promotion will be primary, with some paper copies of posters being printed by members to take to libraries, supermarkets, businesses, schools etc. Members have been asked to circulate posters to their acquaintances.

The two School Boards are being contacted with posters to forward to individual schools to post on their websites. Similarly, MUN, libraries, CNA, Marine Institute (MI), the Multicultural Women's organization (MWONL), Association for New Canadians (ANC) Churches and others will be asked to post our information.

SCHOLARSHIP COMMITTEE REPORT – Grace Stapleton, Chair

Once again this year we were unable to hold our Used Book Sale in the spring, so we had no money to assign to scholarships in May. We did budget \$4000 from our savings to support the two graduate studies scholarships that we have awarded in the past: the Edith Creighton Graduate Scholarship in Education, and the Graduate Scholarship in Gender Studies.

In April we were informed that two students, Elizabeth Dane and Fenna Bradley, were awarded the Graduate Scholarship in Gender Studies (\$1000 each). The Edith Creighton Graduate Scholarship in Education was awarded to Sarah Carter. Our two entrance awards, the Dr. Edith Manuel and Ms Olga Anderson CFUW St. John's Entrance Bursaries of \$1500 each, are funded from our CFUW St. John's Endowment Fund at MUN, so were awarded as usual. The recipients were Ashley Tucker (from Bay Roberts) and Shelby Seymour (from Eastport).

When our Life Member Dr. Audrey Lee passed away last May (2021) at the age of 99, her family contacted us about setting up a scholarship in her name. With the support of the MUN Alumni Development Office a donation fund was established, and remained open until October. The amount raised was \$3275. Audrey"s family agreed to provide additional funds to establish a scholarship of \$1000 for each of five years. It will be awarded annually to a female student who is majoring in chemistry, in her second year of study. The award will be called the Dr. Audrey Lee CFUW St. John's Memorial Scholarship. We hope this scholarship will be awarded for the first time in 2022-2023.

ARCHIVES COMMITTEE REPORT – Daphne Lilly, Archivist

The Archive collection of our club is maintained at the Archives and Special Collections section of the QE ll Library, MUN. The material is accessible for research upon request.

Our members have, in the past, perused the collection for information, but club activity this year has been severely curtailed due to the pandemic. However, members have continued to donate documents of interest to our collection, for which we receive a Deed of Gift from MUN for Archival Works.

The collection is developed under the guidance of the club's Archive Policy.

PROJECT REPORTS

BOOK SALE REPORT – Joyce Noseworthy, Chair

I am pleased to report that we held our Book sale, the first since 2019, on June 21-24. This sale was a smaller version than our previous ones, in terms of both floor space and the quantity of books offered for sale. We thank Crombie Developments for renting the space to us at a very reasonable rate. Thank you to the members who helped and who brought their family members and friends along to help as well. We made over \$26,000; the distribution of the money will be decided at our October meeting.

STUDY GROUPS

ISSUES AND RESOLUTIONS COMMITTEE – Gillian Brown

The Issues and Resolutions Committee has had six meetings to date.

In September, Gillian Brown resigned as Chair of the Issues and Resolutions Committee. In doing so she noted that she and most of the committee members had been on the committee for 10 or more years and that it was time for renewal. The committee was pleased to welcome two new members. As no one wanted to take on the position of Chair it was agreed that everyone would serve as Chair and Secretary in turn. So far, this has worked out satisfactorily.

Actions undertaken by the Issues and Resolutions Committee this year include:

- 1. **Proposed Resolutions for AGM 2022**: The committee studied the six proposed Resolutions with a view to suggesting amendments and making a recommendation for either their adoption or rejection by the club. The resolutions were distributed to all club members and were presented at the general meeting in March.
- 2. **Pay Day Loans**: Following up on last year's action, we met with Al Antle, Executive Director of NL Credit Counseling to discuss the local situation. Consequently, we sent a letter to The Hon. Sarah Stoodley, copied to the opposition leader and independent MHAs concerning high interest rates on these loans. Responses were received from three MHAs.
- 3. Long Term Care: Considering the age of our membership, the committee decided this would be a good project to take on and we have been attempting to educate ourselves on the many issues involved. Last June we met with Elizabeth Siegel, Director, Senior's Resource Centre, NL who gave us a lot of good information about our local situation. We read and discussed the new proposed standards of care being developed by the Canadian Government and attended CFUW sponsored webinars; spoke to executive members of NAPE and the Registered Nurses Union about their concerns regarding Long Term Care in the province; promoted "Invisible No More" webinar held on May 4th, Senior's Day of Action, to the membership.
- 4. **Afghanistan**: In light of the concerns raised by Wazhma Frogh, guest speaker at the October meeting, the committee asked individual CFUW members to write to their members of Parliament expressing concern on a number of points. An information page on the topic was prepared and sent to members to help them in this process. We know of two letters that were written.
- 5. **16 Days of Activism**: Shared the excellent posters developed by National Office with Violence Prevention Avalon East, a variety of churches, CBC, VOCM and The Telegram. Many were also posted on our Facebook page.
